

What does universal access look like?







The legislative and policy framework for FSL in Canada

Jurisdiction	Reality
British Columbia	Discretionary offering; Access conditional on available space and school district policies
Yukon	Discretionary access; no legislative guidance
Alberta	Discretionary offering; the board decides based on available resources and may charge fees
Northwest Territories	Discretionary offering; the District Education Authorities decide based on available human and educational resources
Saskatchewan	Recommended framework – see slide 9
Manitoba	Recommended framework – see slide 9

Le cadre législatif et politique du FLS au Canada (cont.)



Juridiction	Réalité
Nunavut	No offering; no access
Ontario	Discretionary offering; the board decides based on demand and local resources Patchwork access according to board policy
Québec	Discretionary offering; models vary
Newfoundland and Labrador	Discretionary offering; legislation is silent. Policy states that the program can be established when interest and adequate resources make it viable.
New Brunswick	Discretionary offering; the superintendent establishes the program based on demand. A policy exists outlining the criteria required to set up a program.
Nova Scotia	Discretionary offering
Prince Edward Island	Discretionary offering based on available resources and demand

Proven Solutions for Guaranteed Access

In Manitoba

- The Public Schools Act of Manitoba stipulates that if there is sufficient demand (23+ students) from parents, a school division is required to offer French immersion (Art. 79(3)).
- The Regulation on Languages of Instruction and Languages Taught, R.M. 469/88 R, provides additional mechanisms to allow the creation of French immersion programs (i.e. ministerial discretion) and establishes a framework for doing so.



In Saskatchewan

• The *Education Act* of Saskatchewan also provides that the minister can establish French immersion programs (Art. 180[3]), at the request of a school board (Art. 36[1]) or by petition from parents/guardians when 15 students can be grouped together (Art. 36[2]).





French Immersion in Ontario: The Current Landscape

Over 251,000 students enrolled across Ontario 3.9% annual growth over 20 years

~14,000 qualified teachers with quality resources: FSL curriculum, FSL Framework, TFO Idéllo platform Since 1977, school boards have had the flexibility to design and implement
French immersion at their own pace, fostering innovation, research, and success tailored to local realities.


Localized implementation leads to disparities in access and growth of French immersion.

Patchwork admission policies set by school boards limit opportunities.




Enrolment by Program in Ontario

K-12 Enrolment by Program in Ontario, 2023-2024




K-12 Enrolment by Program in Ontario, 2005-2006






FSL Trends in Ontario

Ontario FSL Enrolment Trends (1999 to 2024)









Our Proposal: Universal Access to French Immersion in Ontario

That the Government of Ontario ensure universal access to French Immersion across all Englishlanguage district school boards through legislative, regulatory, and/or policy powers.

We advocate for the creation of:

- 1) The obligation for English-language district school boards to offer French Immersion programs; and
- 2) the right of students to attend French Immersion programs.
